GROWING SOLUTIONS FROM A PRO IMS ALUMNUS TERRY ERB

Farming Takes Faith

You can't be a farmer without a little faith. Or, at least, that is Terry Erb's philosophy.

"Faith is so important in what we do and agriculture in general. Farmers make plans, borrow money, plant a crop and then have faith that it will rain, they have faith that they will be able to be profitable," says Terry. "While this is not a great business model it's just what farmers do."

Even with all its risk, agriculture is what Terry has always wanted to do and what he's been doing since 1982.

After working with a variety of family members in high school, Terry became "extensively involved in ag sales" through his business ProGrower Solutions. For the past 25 years, ProGrower Solutions has sold seed and crop protection to farmers and maintains a row crop operation with livestock production.

A Community and Profession We Love

The best part of the business, says Terry, is the people.

"I really do greatly value the friendships and relationships that have come from our ag retail business, so many good people that I would not have met otherwise," says Terry, "While [balancing business and relationships] can be stressful at times it is also very satisfying."

And farming communities are not as homogenous as outsiders might think.

"We have met and work with great people from different communities, different backgrounds and different viewpoints," says Terry.

"We feel very blessed to be in a great community and in a profession that we love."

Maintaining Roots in Times of Change

Farming has always been about the farmers, but just like many fields, agriculture is changing rapidly with technology. Terry strives to "keep up with the pace of technology" so that Pro-Grower Solutions can continue to be a valuable resource to the Kalona community.

With the rapid change in technology, farming operation size, and the increase of land costs over the past 20 years, there seems to be more risk for farmers. Terry hopes that in all the newness, "the wholesomeness of farming will not be lost." "Farming is so unique and the people involved in it are unique," says Terry.

"[Farmers] take the risk because they love it. They take great pleasure in a newly emerging crop and or a newly born calf or

a new litter of piglets. I hope that there will be a place for all that want to be involved in farming, can be involved."

TERRY ERB ('80) and his wife Deb live in rural Wellman, Iowa. They have two grown children, **Aaron Erb ('10)** and **Lindsay (Erb '06)** Widmer and her husband **Jason Widmer ('05)**. Terry and Deb also have three grandchildren.

A Family Affair IMS ALUMNI DAVE YODER & LUKE YODER

DAVE AND LUKE YODER started farming together as a fatherand son-in-law duo. Below are some of their thoughts on agriculture and family farming.

Q: WHAT HAS YOUR JOURNEY IN AGRICULTURE BEEN LIKE?

DAVE | I have been involved in agriculture since I was a kid. I remember not being able to go out for sports in Jr. High because of needing to help on the farm. I always wanted to farm. As a small child we used to "farm" the dining room rug. I went straight from IMS to farming. I have always lived on the home farm.

LUKE | I have been farming with Dave . . . since 2014 so only about 4 years. After IMS, I attended EMU and graduated from there in 2008 with a Business degree . . . When I started working for Jim [Dave's brother] and Dave on the farm, Jim had decided he wanted to retire and at that point Rachel and I purchased his half of the operation and since then we have been farming with Dave. Farming was something I always had an interest in and when Jim decided he wanted to retire it was an easy decision for Rachel and I to join in the operation.

Q: WHAT IS IT LIKE WORKING TOGETHER AS A FAMILY IN THE AG INDUSTRY?

DAVE | It's all I have ever known. Dad worked with his dad and farmed with his brothers. I grew up working with uncles, cousins and brothers. It was always fun to work with cousins as we baled hay in the summer.

Now we work with the next generation. We have a nephew and son-in-law that farm with us. Everyone brings their own talents and gifts to the operation.

It was interesting to watch God's plan unfold as he brought Luke into the operation. We also have Rachel to thank for that! Luke is meticulous with numbers, marketing, remembering details, documenting and he brings a knowledge of technology that I don't have.

It's reassuring to know that the farm is in capable hands for the years to come.

The farm has been a great place to raise our three daughters and now a big part of life for the grandchildren. They love being here. The flexibility of being able to stop work to give tractor rides and push them on the swing is something I wouldn't be able to do with other jobs. It's also been fun to farm the dining room rug with them.

LUKE | I have really enjoyed working with family. It is rewarding to see how our differing skill sets can work together to accomplish our goals.

I am excited to have my two daughters grow up around their family farm, I think it is a great way to raise a family. I really enjoy being able to spend extra time with them in our less busy times of year and I like having the freedom to decide each day for myself what I need to do.

Q: HOW WOULD YOU DESCRIBE THE WORK THAT YOU DO?

DAVE | There are hog chores seven days a week. Every season is different. Spring means planting and providing seed for other farmers. Summer means crop scouting, mowing and repairs. Fall brings harvest, yield checks and Pioneer sales. Winter means more Pioneer sales, pigs, machine repairs and surviving weather. Then it all starts again.

With each season brings the unknown, crop yields, rain chances, disease, prices of grain and hogs, sickness and death loss with hogs. There are NO guarantees in farming. Without faith that God will provide, the risks of farming would be overwhelming.

LUKE | We raise hogs, corn and soybeans and also have a Pioneer seed dealership. There isn't really a typical day but there is a seasonal pattern. Throughout the year I do a variety of things One of the best parts of what I do is that it seems to be something a little different each day.

Q: WHAT HAS BEEN ONE OF THE GREATEST CHALLENGES OF FARMING?

DAVE | The 1980's were hard and we were relieved to be able to supply for our families and just have the farming operation survive those rough years. Now 2018 brings similar challenges.

LUKE | I would say one of the greatest challenges is understanding that there is a lot that you do not control when it comes to farming. From the weather playing a large role in your crop production to the world markets impacting the price you can get for your crop, there are a lot of unknowns.

Q: WHAT ARE YOUR HOPES AND DREAMS FOR THE COMING YEARS?

DAVE | We are hoping that the farm operation is strong enough to continue for Luke and Rachel. Luke and Rachel took a huge risk in buying into the farm.

Farming is a great way of life. It's been very rewarding to see their desire to keep our farm going. As a farm passed on from one generation to the next it would be nice to see it continue.

We have grandchildren who are very interested in what's going on on the farm. Maybe it will continue to the next generation too.

LUKE | I hope that I can be doing this for a long time. I would like to see this farm continue into the next generation.

DAVE YODER ('77) and his wife Lisa (Miller '82) live in rural Kalona, Iowa. They have three grown children, Lindsay (Yoder '05) Swartzendruber and her husband Jeff Swartzendruber ('06), Rachel Yoder ('07) and her husband LUKE YODER ('04), and Emma (Yoder '11) Brenneman and her husband Collin. Dave and Lisa also have four grandchildren.

AN AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION IMS ALUMNA KYLIE MILLER

CALLED TO CULTIVATE

"It was like God made the path so clear and I never looked back," Kylie says. Her path? Ag education.

Kylie just finished her third year as Ag Instructor and FFA Advisor at Western Christian High School in Hull, Iowa where she started the school's agricultural program.

"In the back of my mind I had dreamed about having the opportunity to start a program, but I had no idea that God would give it to me right out of college," says Kylie, "God has continued to show me how important it is to share about his creation through agriculture."

Kylie grew up in rural Iowa and always had agriculture as a part of her life. At the age of two, Kylie could be found "following [her] dad out to the barn to 'check the piggies.'" Later she would show agricultural savviness by starting a family Pug business and showing sheep and calves.

Her interest was fully realized during her years at IMS with the help of some key teachers.

During Kylie's junior year, former IMS Ag Instructor Marcia Kilgard "introduced [her] to the fact that agriculture was important to [her]."

During her senior year, former IMS Ag Instructor Karen Vande-Walle "showed [her] how absolutely important it is for our world to understand the role agriculture plays in every person's life." Karen was the teacher who "lit the fire" for Kylie to consider Ag Education. After that, the pieces fell into place.

Kyle was accepted into the college of agriculture at Iowa State and upon graduation was hired at Western Christian. She saw God at work in all of this.

"I wouldn't come close to saying that the ag program that I have gotten the opportunity to be a part of is perfect, but I am humbly proud of what my kids and this community has been able to accomplish in the three years of existence."

She adds, "it's been pretty awesome to look back and reflect on how far we've come. From ordering welders, naming our FFA chapter, and figuring out what classes to teach, it has been quite the ride. . . . it has been some of the most fun three years of my life."

Kylie credits her former IMS teachers Karen and Marcia for providing teaching methods, lessons, and strategies that she now utilizes in her FFA Program at Western. They showed her not just "what to teach, but how to teach."

She adds, "the biggest thing that my agricultural instructors showed me, was creating a space that feels like home. Whenever I would walk into the ag room at IMS I just always felt like I was home. I was in a space where I knew I could thrive, where I knew I would enjoy a field trip every once in awhile, where I would have long discussions about faith and agriculture, and

ultimately where I loved being the most. That feeling right there is what I work everyday to make all of my students feel."

CULTIVATING CHRIST FOLLOWERS

In her short tenure, Kylie has managed to cultivate an ag program that is infused with variety and faith in Jesus Christ.

Kylie's classes do everything from making ice cream (animal science) to welding fire pits (welding class) to exploring real world contexts through field trips. In all of this is a central focus on the connection between Christ, creation, and agriculture.

"God's creation is the clearest connection that we have to the proof of His existence and if I can try to show them that through agricultural education, I hope that I'm making an impact," says Kylie.

THE GAP FROM FARM TO TABLE

Kylie is clearly passionate about connecting people to their food.

In the past two years, Kylie says, "the United States saw a shift from the idea, 'don't go into agriculture,' to, 'oh hey, we need agriculture."

She attributes this fact to the farm crisis of the 80's where families were forced into other professions to survive. This had unintended consequences in the 90's and early 2000's when "the disconnect between families and where their food came from widened. Many agricultural programs became 'irrelevant' to some and some even closed."

That trend is changing as Americans start to understand the vital importance of agriculture. In the past 10 years, agricultural education has experienced a resurgence. This included IMS who became the first private school in the state of Iowa to have an FFA chapter when it opened in 2003.

Kylie attributes the growth to a change in attitude.

"People are starting to truly remember why they need agriculture, and while we may not have narrowed that gap all the way, agriculturalists are certainly making strides to make America appreciate and value where their food comes from," she says.

KYLIE MILLER ('11) lives in Hull, Iowa and will receive her master's degree in agricultural education in July of 2019 and plans to continue teaching.

FROM THE OFFICE OF ENROLLMENT

The IMS Board affirmed the recommendation of the IMS Administrative Team by partnering with Rick Newberry, PhD. to help with enrollment and marketing efforts.

Rick Newberry is the President of Enrollment Catalyst. His expertise in enrollment management and marketing strategies provides in-depth consulting and coaching for schools across the country.

He brings over 25 years of educational leadership experience in both higher education and K-12 levels. At the university level, Rick served as the executive director of development and enrollment management at Cornerstone University in Grand Rapids, Michigan. Through his success in enrollment management, he provided strategic leadership to double enrollment from 710 to 1,400 students. In development, he worked alongside the president leading a twenty-member advancement team in a multi-million dollar capital campaign, as well as providing strategic direction to the university marketing effort. Following his tenure in university leadership, Rick served in the role of headmaster at a large private school in St. Petersburg, Florida.

Mr. Newberry will be working with our Administrative Team to develop a strategic plan and provide coaching to implement this plan focused on enrollment management and marketing. He was on the IMS campus two days this week to meet with the administrative team, board and focus groups of current parents, new parents and current students. Surveys will be sent out to all parents, students and faculty members to gather information about IMS that Mr. Newberry will use to provide his assessment and recommendations.

The Administrative Team looks forward to this partnership with Mr. Newberry and has found the time spent with him during his audit to be very helpful. They especially look forward to the results of his information gathering and the weekly coaching he will provide to implement plans.

Thank you to all who participated in this process so far. Your input is very valuable to this effort to better market IMS with the goal of increaseing our enrollment.

CLASS OF 1962 SCHOLARSHIP

THE CLASS OF 1962 held its 55th year reunion September 27-29, 2017 at Crooked Creek Christian Camp with 23 classmates in attendance. It serves as a focal point for many community-wide events that enrich the community and bring it together. After interacting with administrators and students during our IMS visit, we believe The Class of 1962 Scholarship fund is a modest yet effective way to pass along to future students the opportunities we enjoyed at IMS: that of learning more about life and the world in a small, supportive, Christian-focused educational environment.

Many of the friendships we formed in that environment continue to this day.

Part I Home

Born at home on our Swartzendruber family farm 2 miles from IMS, Ruby's life circled around the community, shaped in deeply meditative faith and wrapped in fun by cousins, friends, and family. Like her own mother, Katie Swartzendruber Brenneman, she sang and hummed both hymns and playful songs all day, every day. Her dearest cousins, Faith and Dot, would play church together at the farm, and Faith remembers singing, "Trust and Obey", and, "In the Sweet By and By". The latter was sung in front of everyone at a family reunion but the solemn presentation dissolved into giggles and a common theme emerged, passionate trust and obedience complemented by delighting in laughter, one of many glorious gifts of His love.

Part II Hallelujah

Amidst her travels, teaching, and living the California dream, all of her dearest friends, family, and the six Brenneman and Berger cousins, loved visits and adventures with Ruby. So many Ventura visits revolved around supporting the arts in her area with trips to the theater, concerts, and church choir productions. Ruby carefully researched events to attend, and we have heard world-class opera, organ, orchestra, Christmas and Easter productions in her community and church. She and her dear friend, Joanie Smith, sang in the First Methodist Church choir for years, and Joanie remembers Ruby's favorite being, "Oh, For a Thousand Tongues to Sing", and recalled Ruby had so many good memories of Mennonite churches and hearing the beautiful traditional acapella voices on old favorites. She used to talk about that a lot and had an old cassette tape of a Mennonite Conference choir we would to listen to all the time. We all knew, though, there were a few hymns she did not care for, and we would tease her and many a somber moment would slip into silent, shaking fits of laughter with tears running down our faces. Even in merriment, she was deeply reverent, and prayed without ceasing. Our Ruby gave all the glory for every triumph of His grace, singing all anthems loud to our bountiful Father above, offering tribute of praise for the blessings that hallow our days.

Visits to Ventura included catching up on all the news, for which she had prepared by making a checklist of tidbits to discuss from her carefully underlined papers like The Bruit, Mennonite World Review, The Kalona News, The Wellman Advance, and The Budget. We would have to hash out the details and decode nuances to solve the riddles for the players in the Mennonite game and discover our own place in the extended global family. But mostly we laughed. For those of us who travel

far, the small Iowa community has tethered us with a web of invisible cornsilk, keeping us both grounded and alight.

Our collective memories of Christmas visits to Iowa, include concerts and choirs, and impromptu piano singalongs and silly yodeling. Regardless where we were around Christmas, Ruby's tradition of insisting we all watch or listen to Handel's Messiah was celebrated. We heard every choir in the world on PBS performing the glorious music which crescendos into, "God's Ultimate Victory" and its soaring hallelujahs take us from our humanity into the realms of angels.

Part III Homecoming

Ruby returned to her home community where she passed away April 15, 2017. She left a legacy of humility, generosity, and fun. Her siblings **Keith** ('58) and **Nedra** ('64), and their families, dear cousins, friends, IMS and EMU classmates, feel deeply fortunate to have had Ruby touch their lives with her music. She loved children and spent her life dedicated to educating and supporting them and praying they walk with God to celebrate His Blessing and honour, glory and power, for ever and ever. Amen.

The Miller family often hosted those transplants for Sunday meals – a surefire way to keep them in Kalona was an afternoon laughing with Verton and eating Pearl's cherry pie.

From the time Pearl's father served on the organizing committee to the end of their lives, for the Millers, IMS was integral to this community, and was cherished for its impact on the lives of the youth.


