

### REVERIE **75 YEARS**

The 1947-48 school year produced the school's first official yearbook, the Reverie. The word means to daydream or a condition of being lost in thought. The foreword to the book stated, "Every ship which leaves port is sent forth with purpose. In like spirit we launch the IMS Reverie. That friends of IMS in port and on distant shores, may be informed of her progress and activities. That the crew of the Reverie, in working together, may learn cooperation and loyalty to a common cause. That the students may have a record of their voyage to stimulate reverie in years to come. And that those who hope to come to IMS in the future may know her opportunities and ideals. With faith and hope we bid the Reverie Godspeed!"

The book, which featured a nautical theme with hand drawn pictures of clipper ships and helms was dedicated to "Those whose vision, means, and prayers have made our school possible." Some seventy-five years later, those prophetic words still hold true. As our school continues to move forward, we will sail our ship though new waters, carrying our rich history, with God as our skipper.
